"I wish to thank all the fabulous organisations that proliferate our Shire for the amazing work they do. We are certainly fortunate in having so many dedicated people working to support those less fortunate or protecting our Shire's unique environment" **The change of season is upon us** and soon the new Ballina Surf Club will be in operation. The \$6.2 million facility will be the home of the Ballina Lighthouse and Lismore Surf Lifesaving Club down stairs and the top storey will feature a café/restaurant and large function room available for public hire. A boat storage area and new car park will be completed when the road is realigned. This fabulous building,

> right on the edge of the ocean, fulfils one of the main promises made by the previous Ballina Shire Council to use a combination of Federal, State and its own resources to develop drastically needed

infrastructure for the Shire. I am sure that it will be a very well utilised community facility.

Council is also in the process of finalising plans for the new Marine Rescue Tower that will be constructed as soon as Federal funds are available to match Council's contribution. The building will be a state-



TOP TEN IN STATE Regional Achievement and Community Awards

Well done to two community groups in the Ballina Shire which are top 10 semi finalists in the Regional Achievement and Community Awards. Tweed Byron Ballina Community Transport has been shortlisted for a Community of the Year Award and the Australian Seabird Rescue organisation has been shortlisted in the Environment and Landcare Award Category.

After 25 years of growth, Tweed Byron Ballina Community Transport provides help and essential transport to schools, the elderly, the physically challenged, Aboriginal communities, social groups and youth organisations.

Australian Seabird Rescue Inc (ASR) maintains vigilant patrols of our beaches, creeks and waterways along the NSW coastline rescuing wildlife, removing tonnes of rubbish and raising public awareness. The organisation also represents regional differences with the south coast specialising in the care of penguins and the far north coast operating the second busiest sea turtle hospital in Australia. ASR's WildlifeLink Sanctuary in Ballina attracts more than 6,000 visitors each year.

The official judging takes place on Thursday 19 September with the gala presentation to be held on Saturday 26 October 2013, when finalists will be awarded \$5,000 from the Commonwealth Bank.

of-the-art facility that will provide a communication and observation workplace for our great volunteers.

Work on Ballina Heights Drive and the Wollongbar Sporting Fields is pressing ahead and combines a \$16 million contribution by Council and the Federal Government. Both projects will greatly enhance the amenity of the residents of the Shire. The sporting fields will house rugby, tennis, netball, cricket and AFL in a purpose built facility. Ballina Heights Drive provides the main link to developing areas in Ballina's future growth centre of Cumbalum.

Development is also occurring in the private sector. The revitalised 'Big Prawn' with its new tail and fabulous colours, now sitting proudly at the Bunnings' Store, is a great advertisement for tourism for Ballina as it can be readily seen from the Ballina Bypass. The store, along with the new Woolworths in River Street, to be completed soon, reflects the confidence major retailers have in the Shire.

PORT BALLINA TASKFORCE FORMED

For many years there has been talk of developing a marina on the Richmond River and Council has formed the Port Ballina Taskforce to try to assist the State Government deliver improved marine infrastructure and marine environments in Ballina.

The Taskforce will specifically look at dredging of the bar, boat harbour, the proposed marina, North Creek and the overall health of the Richmond River.

The Taskforce includes Councillors Keith Williams, Paul Worth and Mayor David Wright, and representatives from the Ballina Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Ballina Fishermen's Coop and the NSW Department of Premier and Cabinet.

Nominations for community representatives have now closed and the current Taskforce members will appoint one or two community representatives at the next Taskforce meeting.



COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE - MEETING NEEDS ACROSS THE SHIRE

Council has a number of major community infrastructure projects underway or being planned:

Ballina Surf Club (\$6.2m)

The Surf Club component of this project is completed and Council is now in negotiations to determine a preferred tenant for the café. We are hopeful the café may be operating by Christmas. Other works still to be completed include the re-alignment of Compton Drive and the construction of the new car park, both of which will be finished by Christmas. The building of a new storage/boat shed will start early next year.

Wollongbar Sports Fields (\$7.3m)

This \$7 million sports complex which includes four new football fields, a cricket/AFL field, tennis and netball courts is scheduled to be finished by mid 2014. A large part of the earthworks have already been completed.

Ballina Heights Drive (\$9m)

This new major road link for Ballina Heights connects to the Tamarind Drive roundabout at Ballina Heights and will open up a significant amount of new residential land, as well as providing a convenient link to the new commercial centre proposed for this estate.

Marine Rescue Tower (\$1.8m)

Final designs are in the process of being prepared for a new Marine Rescue Tower at Ballina's North Wall. We expect the plans to be lodged in the next two to three months and once a planning approval is obtained we will be pursuing grant and other funding opportunities to allow the project to be delivered during 2014.

Lennox Head Surf Club and Lake Ainsworth (Project cost to be determined)

Council currently has approximately \$1.5 million available for improvements to the eastern side of Lake Ainsworth, including the closure of the access road, which will be replaced by walking paths and picnic areas as per the adopted

The closure of the road will mean all traffic to the Sports and Recreation Camp will need to use the Camp Drew Road. We currently have expert consultants talking to all the various stakeholder groups who use this location, to determine the preferred options for the long term future of the Lennox Head Surf Club (i.e. renovate or redevelop) as well as the final design for the improvements to the eastern side of Lake Ainsworth.

Coastal Shared Path and Recreational Walk (Project cost \$4m to \$6m)

Planning applications for the various approvals for this project are currently being assessed by Council staff and, with more than \$1.4 million in funding available, as soon as we obtain the approvals we intend to start construction work immediately.

Ballina Sports/Events Stadium (Project cost to be determined)

Council is continuing to examine preferred options for this project and at this time we only have funding available to obtain planning approvals once the preferred location and design are determined. Once planning approvals are obtained Council will be in a better position to lobby the State and Federal Government for grant funding for the project.

Ballina Swimming Pool (\$2m to \$4m)

Council has a high priority for the delivery of an indoor 25 metre pool at the existing facility, along with other infrastructure improvements. Currently, we do not have funds set aside for the project, however we have land for sale that, if sold, will allow us to finalise the designs and seek planning approvals. This will help Council access funds for the project.

Council is committed to ongoing improvements to our playgrounds and parks and over the last five years we have implemented a program of installing new facilities and infrastructure in a large number of our parks. This program is largely completed and our works program is now focusing on improving and enhancing the existing playground equipment.

What do you like about living in Ballina Shire?

What is the one thing that you think the Council should

do to improve the lifestyle you have in Ballina Shire?

Encourage and support all sporting clubs to organise events, carnivals etc. Develop tourism and keep our youth active and involved in the community. Kids in sport are not in court!

Council's Response

We agree active sport is a major part of our Shire and we are currently undertaking major sporting field improvements through the construction of new sports fields at Wollongbar and the expansion of the Saunders Oval fields in Ballina We have purchased land to expand the Skennars Head Sports Fields and remain hopeful that the Ballina Heights and Pacific Pines sports fields will be finished in the next 12 to 18 months. Council is reliant on the developers for the delivery of these last two projects.

We want to provide other community infrastructure that promotes an active lifestyle, such as the long awaited coastal shared path between Ballina and Lennox Head and improvements to the Ballina Swimming Pool. We would also like to provide an indoor sports and events centre. This last project will need a healthy injection of State or Federal Government grant funding.

What do you like about living in Ballina Shire?

It is a small community and you pretty much know everyone around town, and it's a friendly town.

What is the one thing that you think the Council should do to improve the lifestyle you have in Ballina Shire?

We need more things for younger people to do, including attracting more people from out of the area to come and stay here rather than at Byron Bay.

Council's Response

This is a complex one as we do benefit by being located near Byron Bay, which to be fair has an international reputation. We are committed to providing infrastructure that not only benefits local residents but also attracts visitors to our Shire. A good example of this is the new Ballina Surf Club, which once fully completed, with a café operating, will provide a destination for visitors.

As residents of the Ballina Shire many of us occasionally choose to visit Byron Bay rather than live there. From a tourism perspective we are now seeing more and more people stay in the Ballina Shire as our facilities and services expand. People still visit Byron Bay but often don't stay there for the whole holiday.

We need to provide more community infrastructure, such as the shared path, to attract visitors, and we need to work with business owners to ensure our facilities meet visitor demands.

We are always seeking feedback on options to attract more people to our Shire and any feedback would be appreciated by our Tourism staff who can be contacted at the Visitor Information Centre.

What do you like about living in Ballina Shire?

Beautiful beaches and a majestic river embracing the edge of town. Fantastic walking tracks. Friendly, relaxed people.

What is the one thing that you think the Council should do to improve the lifestyle you have in Ballina Shire?

The Council should build a Marina. River Street is dying.

If Ballina had a Marina the streets would be busy, shops, restaurants, cafes bars and clubs would be patronised. A Marina would bring life back to our town.

Council's Response

It is unfortunate that we occasionally hear the statement that "River Street is dying" and it is not a view that we share in Council. Main streets in town centres, around the world, are struggling to retain their high profile in this age of on-line shopping and competition from larger retail complexes such as Ballina Fair and Ballina Central that move retail businesses out of the town centre.

We are continually researching ideas and strategies implemented by other councils and businesses and we remain confident that River Street will

remain the heart of our Shire.

Woolworths has confidence in River Street having invested more than \$10 million in its new supermarket, which will be 50% bigger than the store that was damaged by fire. We look forward to the new store opening late this year.

Council has purchased two properties in Tamar Street to provide additional carparking. These properties will be demolished shortly and the construction of the carpark, and public toilets will provide a boost.

We are also planning renovations to the Wigmore Arcade complex which should provide another boost to the town centre.

A marina is something we have been promoting with the NSW Department of Lands, the owner of most of the river foreshore. Prior to the global financial crisis the Department tried to obtain private investment to build a marina, but unfortunately this was unsuccessful.

A marina is a high risk and complex commercial venture and from a Council perspective it is considered too risky to invest public money. We have formed the Port Ballina Taskforce, which you can read about on page 5 of this edition. The Taskforce representatives will work together to assist the State Government in delivering improved marine infrastructure for Ballina.





FREE CHILD RESTRAINT SAFETY CHECKS

Ballina Shire Council, in partnership with Dancers Car Care, a local RMS authorised restraint fitter, is offering \$30 vouchers to local families for a free child restraint safety check or installation.

Parents and carers living in the Ballina Shire can visit Ballina Shire Council's Customer Service Centre to collect a free voucher to have your child restraint, harness and booster seat checked or installed for free.

Using a correctly fitted and age appropriate restraint greatly increases a child's safety in a crash. A research study, funded by the RMS, has shown that children who are restrained incorrectly are up to seven times more likely to be seriously injured in a crash than children who are restrained correctly.

Residents who are not able to collect a voucher can phone Jodie Hewett, Road Safety Officer on 6686 4444. The child restraint vouchers are valid until 30 June 2014 and conditions apply.

BALLINA TO HOST 2014 AUSTRALIAN COASTAL COUNCILS CONFERENCE


Ballina Shire Council will host the 2014 Australian Coastal Councils' Conference in March 2014.

NEW ART IN COUNCIL FOYER

Next time you are in the Council building in Cherry Street have a look at the new artwork by the Saltwater Women which is on display in the foyer.

In 2012 Council invited Expressions of Interest from Aboriginal community members to produce an artwork design for installation in the foyer of Council's Customer Service Centre in Ballina. A key aim of the project was to recognise the significance of Aboriginal people and culture in our Shire.

The Saltwater Women's art group started in July 2004 and was given a traditional name by a respected Bundjalung Elder, Gehi Yubay Dubay (Saltwater Women). The group meets every week at the Bunjum Community Centre.

The women have a strong bond within their community and tell stories of their shared history. Many of the women grew up on Cabbage Tree Island.



PROTECTING THE RICHMOND RIVER

The Richmond River is the lifeblood of Ballina Shire and Council is committed to ensuring the ongoing health of the river.

We are working with the Richmond River County Council on an 'Ecohealth' water quality project in the Richmond River estuary and its tributaries.

Ecohealth is a program developed by the Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority which assesses the health of a river and estuary using a standard set of indicators. These indicators measure water quality and the populations of fish and other creatures living in the river.

Monitoring is undertaken over a twelve month period, and will begin in early September 2013. Once monitoring is complete, a report card will be published showing the health of the river and its tributaries for the period. The Ecohealth project is designed to be repeated every three years to monitor changes over time.

Did you know

that the overall amount of water on our planet has remained the same for two billion years? This means that the water falling from your shower tonight may have once fallen on a dinosaur!

Water moves around the earth in a water cycle which has five parts: evaporation, condensation, precipitation, infiltration and surface run-off, naturally cleaning itself as it goes through this cycle.

Only 1% of the earth's water is drinkable and as our world's population increases, human activities such as urbanisation and agriculture are altering our natural water cycle. To help alleviate these imbalances, we need to think about cleaning and re-using our wastewater to help take pressure off our precious drinking water.

To replicate and speed-up natural water cleansing processes, Ballina Shire Council has, over the past eight years upgraded our sewerage treatment facilities at Lennox Head and Ballina into 'Recycled Water Treatment Plants'.

The water that comes out of these plants has been through a variety of cleaning processes including biological treatment, membrane filtration and disinfection and is ready to be reused or released into our waterways.



Crystal the recycled water drop represents the recycled water which is starting to travel through purple pipes to open spaces and new houses.

> We need to start using her recycled water for things like 'toilet flushing' and 'watering the garden', instead of our precious drinking water.

> > As Ballina Shire's population grows and we move into the future, Crystal will protect our water availability in times of drought and uncertainty.



This tender is for the upgrade of sections of Tamarind Drive north of Ballina plus a section of Byron Bay Road immediately south of the Byron Shire boundary. The Byron Bay Road section is being funded by a \$630,000 Road Safety grant from RMS.

Emigrant Creek Boat Ramp Pontoon, West Ballina

This contract will be awarded soon and the project will enhance the recently completed boat ramp carpark. This will be partly funded by a \$35,000 grant from the RMS Better Boating Program.

Coastal Recreation Pathway - Lodged Development Applications

It has been a long process but we are getting closer to the construction of a shared path/walkway linking East Ballina to Lennox Head. Council recently finalised route options and has submitted documentation seeking planning approval for the shared path.

Did Council close the Shelly Beach Café?

No. This business was privately sold by the former owner. The new owner(s) then chose not to operate the business until such time as they had redeveloped the site. A development application was lodged by the new owner for the redevelopment of the café to provide a facility that could manage all weather conditions. This new building requires approval from Council and Crown Lands (State Government) as the café is located on Council and Crown land.

Council has provided planning approval for the redevelopment however to allow the new building to proceed the State Government has requested Council acquire a portion of the adjoining Crown land. To assist the new owner Council is in the process of acquiring this land at market value with the new owner then paying an increased rental to Council.

The new owners have been paying Council the full rental for the business since it was purchased, although they have recently asked Council to consider some rental relief while the land acquisition is finalised.

Did Council close the café in Fawcett Park?

No. The previous operator of this café was placed in liquidation by a creditor in 2012. This immediately terminated the lease with Council. Council subsequently proceeded to call for Expressions of Interest (EOI) for a new café operator. After a lengthy EOI process, in what have been tough times for café operators, Council appointed a new operator.

Unfortunately, prior to the new lease being signed with this operator, the building was badly damaged by the extreme wind conditions we had in February this year. This required Council as the owner of the building, the new operator and the insurer to agree on how the building would be repaired and refurbished and how the costs would be apportioned. Agreement has now been reached between all three parties in regard to the building repair works and renovations. Council has now called tenders to appoint a builder to commence the reconstruction of the building and a decision on the successful builder will be made at the September Council meeting. This will allow the works on the building to commence in October with a ten week construction period expected.

The commencement of the building work will allow a new lease to be signed for the café.

IMPROVING PORTER PARK

Porter Park in West Ballina is a great place to play or kick a ball and Council wants to get more people using the park. A consultation program will canvas views and suggestions from residents on how they would better use the park.

We want people to think as broadly as possible. We have a blank canvas to work with, along with a current budget of \$100,000. The park could be used for passive recreation such as landscaping, shading and seating to make it a more pleasant environment. It could include playground equipment or a number of elements.

Community feedback will form the basis of concept designs that will be presented to community forums for comment before being taken to Council for approval.

Time with Ballina Shire Council: Two and a half years. My primary role is Operations Engineer for Water and Wastewater and more recently I've been Acting Manager of Waste.

Before coming to Ballina Shire Council I worked with Sydney Water as a Project Engineer on their Priority Sewerage Program which provided sewerage services to unsewered communities and townships of Sydney. I started with Sydney Water as a graduate engineer.

What does your job entail: It's been a busy few years for Ballina Shire Council with major upgrades to the Lennox Head and Ballina Wastewater Treatment Plants, preparing them for the production of Recycled Water. In my role as Engineer for Water and Wastewater I oversee the operations of these Plants, along with the Alstonville and Wardell Plants. The role also requires keeping the entire wastewater and water network operating as efficiently as possible.

I am currently in an acting role, managing the waste operations and resource recovery. Resource recovery extracts materials from waste that can be recycled to reduce waste and make better use of resources. One project that the Waste Division is currently looking into is a commercial scale biochar project, where waste organics is converted into biochar and renewable energy.

NEW BIKE RACKS AND MOTORCYCLE PARKING

What training and study have you undertaken that has helped you in your roles with Council? I graduated with a Bachelor of Engineering in Mechatronics from the University of Southern Queensland. Mechatronics covers mechanical, electrical, control and computer engineering. I also completed a Masters of Engineering Management at University of Technology, Sydney.

Best part of the job: Ballina Shire Council has provided me with exciting opportunities to be involved in innovative projects focused on sustainability of our resources. These include the Recycled Water treatment plants incorporating membrane bioreactor technology, and the biochar project using pyrolysis technology.

Most memorable moment whilst at Ballina Shire Council: During the two major storm events we experienced in January and February our Treatment Plants were really put to the test. It is during these high pressure times that you're challenged to put your theory into practice.

What to you like about living in Ballina Shire: I love the coastlines and that there are so many beautiful areas to explore.

In my spare time: I like to spend time with my family and scout out the beautiful spots in our region to photograph. I've recently created an online photo blog (tonylpartridge.com) where I upload photos that I've taken of places, people and events around the region and beyond.

If I won lotto: It would depend on how much I won but I would probably pay off my student debt and then collect the change in one dollar coins and like Scrooge McDuck sit on my pile of gold coins throwing them in the air with delight.

Council's footnote: During the two major storm events in early 2013 Tony was instrumental in ensuring that Treatment Plants kept operating and processing wastewater. His quick grasp of the circumstances and his calmness under pressure ensured that the Plants did not fail and continued operating so as to reduce the impact on residents.

NEW Gently Eco Nappy can go in the organic bin

One of the big issues for parents with young children is the disposal of plasticlined nappies. Considering babies will use up to 5,000 nappies in their first few years and normal disposable nappies

take around 100 years to biodegrade, this is a significant problem.

While some environmentally conscious parents use modern cloth nappies, 95% of young parents are still using time-saving disposable nappies.

There is good news for people wanting an alternative to plastic disposable nappies with Lismore Composting Facility



approving a new fully disposable nappy brand called 'Gently Eco Nappy'. It's made from a combination of bamboo, wood pulp and corn starch biofilm and can therefore go in the organics bin for waste collection.

Ritchie's IGA and 'Nourish all of You', in Ballina, will be stocking the new compostable nappies which will be very competitively priced.

ORGANICS BINS CONTINUE TO BE A BIG SUCCESS

It's been two years since we introduced the three bin garbage service in the Ballina Shire. The majority of residents are making the most of the organics bin and using it to dispose of their kitchen scraps as well as the green waste from their gardens.

The aim of introducing the organics bin was to reduce the amount of waste going into landfill. In two years we have halved the amount of waste going to landfill. Thank you for your cooperation.

Many residents simply wrap their scraps in newspaper and put them in their organics bin while others choose to use compostable bags. These bags are the only ones that break down quickly as they contain no plastic. Please make sure the bags you put in the organics bin contain no plastic - most shopping bags are unsuitable.

Plastic bags can only go in the general waste bin. They cannot go in the organics or recycling bin. We encourage you to carry your own reusable shopping bags and say 'no' when shop assistants offer plastic bags as they will end up in landfill.

COUNCIL'S SECOND FREE MULCHED GREEN WASTE A WINNER WITH GARDENERS

Hundreds of happy residents took advantage of the offer of free mulch in August at Ballina's Waste Facility.

Vehicles were lined up before the event started and by 2pm free mulch had been collected in 95 cars, 32 utes and 44 trailers.

The day was organised to help residents save water by mulching their gardens early and preparing their soils for the hot summer months ahead.

This is the second free green waste event to be organised by Ballina Shire Council however residents are able to purchase mulched green waste cheaply all year round.

HOLY FAMILY PRIMARY SCHOOL TAKES ON THE 3-BIN SYSTEM

The Holy Family Primary School at Skennars Head added recycling and organics bins to its waste program in July making it the first school in the Ballina Shire to use the 3-bin system.

Council's Waste and Water Education Officer, Kate Pye helped implement the new 3-bin system and education program to teach students how to recycle.

"New educational stickers have been designed to make it easier for students to choose the right bin when disposing their rubbish," Kate said.

A group of students known as the PEAPODS, Powerful Eco Association Protecting Our Delicate Surroundings, requested the change to their school's waste contract which was mostly made up of general waste bins.

"I received beautiful letters from the students who were concerned for the environment and their desire to recycle at school and Council was eager to help," Ms Pye said.

Previously, Holy Family Primary School had 16 general waste bins and eight cardboard bins. The school has installed eight new 3-bin stations for general waste, recyclable waste and organic waste. The PEAPODS now have to make the system work and keep contamination down by making sure their peers put waste in the correct bin.

FREE DISPOSAL OF OLD TELEVISIONS AND COMPUTERS AT BALLINA WASTE FACILITY

Wondering what to do with your old unwanted televisions, computers or printers?

You can now dispose of your electronic waste (e-waste) for free at the Ballina Shire Waste Facility in Southern Cross Drive, Balliina.

It's part of the National Television and Computer Recycling Scheme which involves a combination of government regulation and industry action to reduce the amount of television and computer waste going to landfill.

The scheme aims to boost the recycling rate of these products from 17% in 2010 to 80% by 2021-22. More than 90% of the materials used to make products like televisions and computers can be recovered and recycled.

So what's accepted?

Residents can drop off, free-of-charge, the items listed below. A limit of 15 items per drop off applies. Under no circumstances will products be returned once disposed of.



TELEVISIONS

• All televisions, such as CRTs, plasma, LCD and projection televisions.

COMPUTERS

- Personal computers
- Laptops, notebooks, palmtops and tablets
- Computer monitors
- Parts for personal computers eg: internal hard drives, motherboards, cards, internal power supplies, CPUs, DVD and CD drives
- Computer peripherals eg: mice, keyboards, joysticks, game pads, scanners & web cameras
- Printers eg: ink-jet, dot matrix, laser printers and multifunctional devices.

What's not accepted?

- Mobile phones
- Game consoles eg: Microsoft Xboxes or Sony Playstations
- Video recorders
- DVD players
- Radios/stereos
- Power tools
- Appliances/microwaves
- Products that have been exposed to radiation, biological or chemical hazards
- Set top boxes.

Electronic Waste (e-Waste) is Australia's fastest growing type of waste

24/7 access for people with disabilities

THE MASTER LOCKSMITH ACCESS KEY (MLAK)

What is MLAK?

The Master Locksmith Access Key (MLAK) is a system that allows 24 hours a day access for people with a disability to public amenities across Australia.

In Ballina Shire accessible amenities are routinely open during daylight hours, however it is necessary to lock them overnight to protect community building assets and to ensure the facility is ready and available for the next day.

The MLAK is designed to increase access for eligible people to amenities that would, under normal circumstances, be locked after hours.

Who is eligible for a key?

To receive a key you will need to be a resident of Ballina Shire (proof of identity will be required), have a disability impeding your mobility that is apparent, or otherwise a letter from a medical practitioner, disability organisation or community health centre verifying your disability.

Where can you obtain a key?

Eligible people are able to obtain a key from Council's Customer Service Centre, 40 Cherry Street, Ballina.

What does it cost?

There is no cost to eligible residents.
