What is Pacific Oyster Mortality Syndrome?

Pacific Oyster Mortality Syndrome (POMS) is a disease caused by a virus. It causes rapid mortalities in Pacific Oysters.

There is no evidence that POMS affects Sydney Rock Oysters.

POMS does not have any impacts on human health.

Where does POMS occur?

POMS occurs in three NSW oyster farming estuaries and in Tasmania. Some healthy Pacific Oysters are harvested and sold for human consumption from affected farms.

Help protect the NSW oyster industry

Follow these simple steps to help stop freshly opened oysters spreading POMs:

- Do not return live oysters to our waterways, either to discard them or 'give them a drink' to keep them fresh. <u>It is illegal</u>, as it can spread disease or lead to the oyster being contaminated and harmful to eat
- Dispose of waste, including uneaten oysters or leftover shells in the bin.

- Dispose of any water used to process live oysters direct to the sewer
- Wash hands and/or gloves thoroughly with warm soapy water after handling oysters
